### A Hymn of Trust and Hope for the New Year

As the calendar turns to 2010, we may find ourselves looking ahead to the new year and wondering what it will bring. Whatever the future may hold, we can enter the new year knowing that God is still our faithful God and is at work for our good. (Romans 8:28) One of our favorite hymns expresses the trust and hope which sustains us throughout the year.

Philip Doddridge wrote the text, which was published in 1755 in the collection *Hymns Founded on Various Texts in the Holy Scriptures*. The caption to the hymn reads “Help obtained from God. Acts 26:22. For the New Year.”

Philip Doddridge (1702-1751) was born in London. One of twenty children, he was orphaned at an early age. He became a nonconformist minister. He was a supporter of John Wesley and George Whitefield and a friend of Isaac Watts. Doddridge wrote more than four hundred hymns, all published after his death from tuberculosis. In addition to his hymns, he wrote *The Rise and Progress of Religion in the Soul* and *The Family Exposition*.

May we enter this new year rooted in the faith expressed in his hymn.

“O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel!” (“from O Little Town of Bethlehem”) Christmas has come and gone . . . and maybe New Year’s Day has as well. The post-holiday blues may be setting in for some of us as the long, dark days of winter surround us like an icy mantle. Our days of singing Christmas Carols are waning and we’re beginning to miss them. Can’t we keep the spirit of Christmas alive a little longer? Well, why not? *Emmanuel* in Hebrew means “God with us” and this is what we’ve been celebrating. On January 6, we celebrate Epiphany, the 12<sup>th</sup> day of Christmas, when the “Wise Men” followed a star and came bearing gifts to see the baby Jesus in Bethlehem, no longer in the manger, but in a house where Mary and Joseph have by now found shelter. As we sing “We Three Kings” we might feel a tinge of sadness because we know it signals the end of this season. The decorations will have to be taken down and put away for another year, and our houses will look drab in comparison to how they were so recently festooned. But wait, Epiphany is actually a *season* in the life of the Church that goes on until Lent begins! It’s so easy, though, to lose the sense of celebration we revel in during Advent and Christmas. The word “Epiphany” comes from the Greek noun *epiphaneia*, which means “shining forth, manifestation or revelation.” The big Epiphany is the time when we celebrate the gift of God’s coming to the whole world, but the epiphanies of life are many and varied, if we stay on the lookout. As we watch birds scratching for food outside our windows or see the red berries still on the honeysuckle peeking out from under a fresh blanket of snow, we see *life* in all its goodness and we can pause and thank God for these reminders of God’s presence in the world in which we live. We may have put our crèches away for another year, but we can still peer into the manger of our own hearts that shelter the Babe who abides with us, and we can rest in a deep knowledge that God truly *is* with us all.

A key component of aluminum is bauxite--mined in the western African

### Sweat for Nets Facts

**Malaria:** a disease that is spread by the bite of an infected Anopheles female mosquito

**Symptoms:** fever and chills, vomiting and sweating. 90% of Malaria cases are in Africa, others are in Asia and Central and South America.

**Every 30 seconds a child dies of malaria.**

**Prevention:** sleep under an insecticide treated mosquito net.

**Cost of a net: under \$10!**

## **MISSION AND OUTREACH COMMITTEE**

### **Local Mission Opportunities:**

**The Mission and Outreach Committee** will start providing information to our congregation each month about opportunities for volunteer service in our community as a way of encouraging our members to become involved in mission. As a church we need to find ways to reach out to those in need. One such volunteer opportunity is the

following: **The Community Counseling & Crisis Center 110 South College Avenue, Oxford.**  
**Contact person: Mary Shinn**

"Although it helps to have a psychology, counseling or other mental health background, it is not required or necessary. They will provide the basic training you need. As a rape crisis advocate, there is a required training at the center in Oxford, mostly in crisis counseling techniques and discussion on myths vs. facts of rape. After completion of the training, you will be given a toolkit/bag with cards, forms, and brochures to use during your shift.

There is a monthly time commitment which is flexible but basically you are then on call while at home. When a rape incident has occurred, you will either get a call from the local hospital or possibly the crisis hotline indicating that a rape has occurred and you will be asked to go to the hospital in the area---Oxford, Middletown, Hamilton, Fairfield to provide support to the rape victim and family members/friends present. You are usually on call with someone else so one can work with the client while the other can work with the family or friend at the location to provide support and resources for next steps. Sometimes you may also get a call from the hotline that someone wants to talk with you regarding a past rape, post traumatic stress symptoms, or concerns about what to do after the rape has occurred. Counseling support is provided via phone. You will have to block your # to return calls for your safety. Sometimes you will have no calls while you are on call but there is no guarantee. One time there was a triple rape reported within 10 minutes of each other at 3 different hospital locations at 2 or 3 AM and I had to drive to one hospital while my partner went to the other. We called the rape crisis supervisor and she went to the other hospital. It can be tiring and the situations can be stressful but you are providing a service to women when they are confused, afraid, and often uncertain about what the next appropriate steps to take are to ensure their safety and capture of the perpetrator. The hospital exam to collect evidence and the interrogation with the police can be very intimidating. By volunteering as a rape crisis advocate, I was able to help these women find a voice, calm their fears, and let them know that they had a right to go forward and that no matter what the preceding actions were to the rape, they didn't deserve to be treated in that way. It is about

providing mental health support, providing compassion, and basically giving a shoulder to lean on if they needed it. The community crisis center also needs volunteers to man their 24-hour hotline where you will have to field a variety of calls and provide support via phone, including referring a call in to some other agency. Hotline workers are also needed. They take shifts at the crisis center manning the phones”

An Additional Note from **Rev. Mamie Broadhurst**  
*Giving Thanks Each Day...*

**Richard** and I have been in Colombia for just over a month and we are still settling in. We continue searching for an apartment, struggling to figure out the cell phone system, learning the names of common vegetables, and finding our way around Barranquilla. We still have a lot to learn. Sometimes that can be frustrating...

What we have found is that the best way to combat our frustration is to give thanks each day for the things we have learned, the kindnesses people have shown us, the things we do well, and the blessings that are showered upon us. For instance, I have my "angel of the day." In a country whose people have every right to fear unknown people in their midst, I have found a remarkable willingness to talk and/or show help. From a tap on the shoulder from a woman I had never met offering me an eraser, to a proud citizen telling me about things to see in his home town, to a fairly critical bathroom stop, people have shown that hospitality is truly one of the best gifts that one can give.

We felt that as clearly in our recent trip around Uraba Presbytery as we have anywhere. At their 7th Annual Men's Gathering we were given the best rooms with mosquito netting, and folks made sure we always had enough to eat. As we continued our tour we stayed in people's homes, generally displacing them from their own rooms and beds, always with the assurance that they were much more comfortable on the floor with no fan. We saw beauty beyond compare, heard stories that could lift your spirits and break your heart, and look forward to going back for another visit soon. The chance to visit a community of displaced persons, the opportunity to offer translating help, visiting churches around the country, to preach, to sing, to share. We are grateful for the leadership of the women and men of the Presbyterian Church of Colombia (IPC) as they work to spread the Good News through word and deed. Peace~

## **SLIGHTLY IRREVERENT SYNOPSIS OF 2009 SESSION**

Another productive and learning year is winding down and the walls of the Molyneaux Lounge have quietly observed our lives. In December of 2008 we held a non-meeting, southwest Ohio weather stormed against us and we each spent that Tuesday evening with our own thoughts and preholiday activities.

The New Year brought the retirement of several elders, among them **Gil Pacey**. This elevated **Tom Holmes** to BMOS – Big Man on Session. Martin Luther King National Workday brought out 19 Presbyterians, all experts in the fine art of rummage, to the Family Resource Center, where they sorted mountains of donated used clothing.

Due to the gatekeeper's curiosity inquiry was made into why we form the roll at each meeting, specifically, what fate befalls the elder who neglects to inform the powers that be of their impending absence? A slap on the hand? A cut in pay?? According to Roberts Rules of Order – “members of a body that has a legal authority to compel attendance of its members can actually have absent members taken into custody by an arresting officer and be disciplined or fined”. So – if you are anywhere but in this room on the third Tuesday of the month you might want to watch over your shoulder for the approach of the Oxford gendarme.

Historical note: the May 12, 1925 minutes stated that Session voted an amount of \$5 to be presented to each student for their participation in the choir. At the planning session, held at the Knolls in February, ideas were bandied about that would get more active members to be more active – mention

was made, quietly, of a marguerita machine – no one seemed to take credit for the idea – but is the theme Los Posadas for Advent a result of this line of thinking?

The June meeting was cancelled, and the sky did not fall! Too few elders were available, no business to take action on, good sense prevailed.

Historical note: June 16, 1936: Mrs. Shinkle reported that a new floor had been installed in the coal bin in the manse. Two coal companies in town bid on the coal supply for the coming year. Twenty tons of coal were delivered. The February 22, 1938 minutes reported that fuel for the 1937-38 year cost \$484.56.

Regrouping in August members shared highlights of their summers – enjoying the shores of Lake Michigan, one family traveling to both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and remained friendly, savoring Oxford sans students and adding a cat to a household.

Historical note: October 1936: a substitute organist will be paid \$5 for two Sundays, nothing for the third Sunday. And January 6, 1936 meeting approved hiring a part time secretary (3 days a week) to be paid \$400 annually.

**Pat Gifford, Susan Maxfield, and Bill Fisher** will not be gracing our table next year (maybe an exception for Bill as he becomes **Rob Rollins**) – we are indebted to all three for their work. **Pat** – 6 calendar years with this body which has probably translated into twice that much time when we think about the many hats she has donned. The myriad opportunities that membership has offered – the “**Jack Staberg** kiosk”, pictorial directories, planters at the front entrance, Welcome Back picnics, AFS dinners – then Oxford became a bit confining so she was a commissioner to Presbytery meetings – and that not being enough it was reported that she was seen wandering the streets of Zlatoust (Zlataoost) with Igor and his co-horts. And her swan song of Holy Conversations. You have had a full, and we hope fulfilling six years.

**Susan** not only was on the roster of Worship and Music but put her “money where her mouth is” and opened that mouth every Thursday evening and

Sunday morning, filling out the alto section (along with her water bottle). She was instrumental in carrying out **Ellen's** idea of honoring choir members with Stoussland pins for years of service. And the choir is sitting much prettier, and more comfortably on the new upholstered chairs in the loft. One year **Susan** not only sang two services on Easter but also made the choir breakfast happen. Keep singing, **Susan**...

**Bill's** Presbyterian footprint looms large – wished for gifts with peacemaking, trying to make sense of financial matters, propagating the germ of a mustard seed into a viable investment group in spite of the wacky world of finance we have experienced, his natural interest in mission and the visit of Igor, the gleaming tuba with the Oxford Brass at special Sunday services. His biggest impact, however, may be the effect of his two girls and their fashion sense on Sunday mornings – sopranos are sometimes heard to whisper under their breath “Look what they are wearing today!”

The year is culminating with the Holy Conversations Planning Team, gathering much data, talking to many people in a variety of venues and leading the congregation to an even more vital and responsive life in the years ahead.

It is with great thanks that the Session particularly, and the congregation as a whole, thank **Susan, Pat** and **Bill** for their many hours of work, over the past terms they have served.

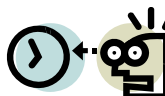
